Spanish Silks

Spanish Silks an overview part one - 8th to 12th century

Esperanza de Cordoba



A terazero is a Spanish word for a weaver of silk. During the Islamic period in Spain many skilled craft-persons including silk weaver from place such as Syria, Iran and Yemen came to Southerns Spain and shared their knowledge and skills. Cordoba, which was established as a capital of Al-Andalus (Andalusia) in 756, became known for its splendidly woven silks.

Silk was not an indigenous product of Spain initially as was imported for robes and vestments from Baghdad to Byzantium. When weaving began in Cordoba they would send for raw silk from Iran until Spain developed its own sericulture – the process of extracting silk from the silkworms cocoon.

Silk weavers might fashion squares or oblong blocks of tapestry like images to be applied to

garments. There were a variety of symbols, emblems, animals, birds and calligraphy that could be woven directly into cloth, cloaks or other garments Pre 1200 rondals were favourited as well as Tiraz -a weaving variation that refers to strips of silk with woven inscriptions, often using Arabic letterings but sometimes Byzantium and Latin appears as well. Tiraz could include lines of blessings, holy names of Allah, history and titles, or lines of poetry.

One such example appears to be a weaver with a sense of humor. The line reads from right to left in arabic script "I am looking forward" which is

then mirrored with the mirroring image of the bird...each bird thinking they are "looking forward".

The Tiraz factory in Cordoba was one of the first "weaving pavilions" throughout the Islamic world, but soon many states followed the economic example. The honor of managing the Tiraz pavilion was usually bestowed upon a noble of the court. There would be hundreds of looms in a Tiraz pavilion, each with its own project. Tiraz bands were worn by royals and the daughters of Christian princes, and by the rich. They would be given as gifts of honor and some rich weaved silks were sent as gifts to royals in France.

Almeria in Spain was home to a flourishing silk trade. The French called these fabrics pale d'Aumarie or le soie d'Aumarie in old french romances. It is noted that Ay of Avignon, the niece of

Charlemagne, was fond of and wore rich Almerian silks.

Malaga in Spain was also an important center for silk weaving and gold-threaded silk after 1100. The city was quite famous for its weaving of all manner of beasts including two-headed eagles, peacocks, and elephants with gold thread woven within.

Near the end of the 12th century ovals, hexagonal frames and stellate shapes took more prominence over the rondals seen previously. Spain was begining to establish its own style and artistic characteristics making Spanish Silk weaving more unique and thus also more desirable.
